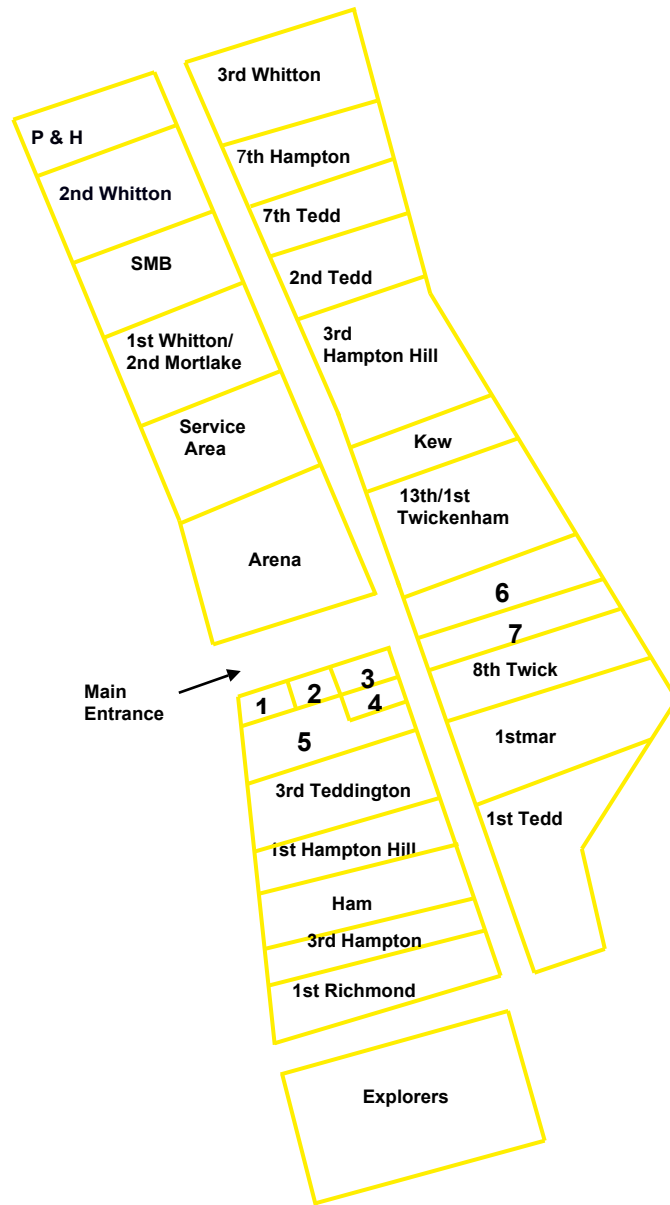


TWICKEREE 2009 SITE PLAN



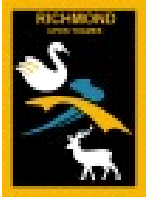

If you would like to know more about the Scouting opportunities available or how you can actively support Scouting please visit our information area near the main entrance.

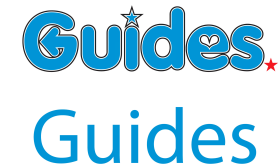

WANGLE 111



Wangle 111 was the 27 ft Whaler, owned and crewed by 1st Mortlake Sea Scouts, which was tragically lost at sea in August 1950, on its return from Calais to Mortlake, with the death of all ten on board. In due course, a grave was established on the island of Texel, in northern Holland, where a number of the bodies had been found. Since that time, the Texel Scout and Guide Group has continued to tend the grave, in memory of those lost in the service of Scouting. When the 1st Mortlake Sea Scout Group closed, the colours and one remaining fragment from the stern of the boat were transferred, to be kept from now on in the Texel Scout headquarters.

We greatly value the help of numerous local people and charities that have made it possible to bring members of the Group over for the weekend to receive a special presentation of thanks from the Scout Association and a personalised certificate on Sunday morning.

In this the Centenary of Sea Scouting we welcome the relatives and friends of the Scouts and all those that contributed so generously to enable this visit by our Scouting friends from Texel, Holland to be with us this weekend.

The Sections and Programme

Scouting is open to all young people aged 6 to 25 of every faith and background. There are five Sections:



Beaver Scouts 6 - 8 year olds

All sections usually meet on one evening during the week, although they may also go to camps and other days out throughout the year.

Whilst the activities they take part in will depend on their age, each Section gives young people the opportunity to learn by doing. The main programme areas are: Outdoor and Adventure; Global; Community; Fit for Life; Creative and Beliefs; and Attitudes. Scout Leaders are trained to deliver this programme, ensuring our young people stay safe while they enjoy themselves and learn.
